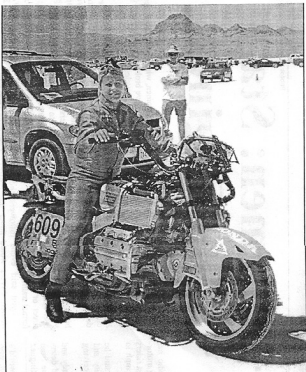


Johnson at the Bonneville Salt Flats in Utah where she recently set two motorcycle landspeed records.

Lyon's goal for his team is to break the current Guinness world record of 322 mph for motorcycle land speeds. In a few months, Johnson plans to step into the 24-foot Goldwing 1500 Streamliner, a feat never attempted by a woman.

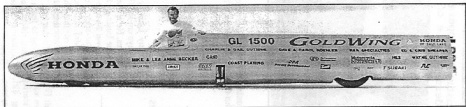
Lyon, who offers a variety of motorcycles to race, said the chance to race motorcycles with a professional's bike is a great opportunity for interested parties. To him, there is no greater rush than legally driving a motorcycle more than 200 mph.
